
# The Hear and Say Centre Adventure Is:

# Chairperson's Report



The last year at Hear and Say has been one of great change. We have seen the end of our beginning and commencement of new development phase. During the year a concept of a total program encompassing from first diagnosis to 18 years was conceived and we set about determining а means of realising our dream establishing Queensland's first

fully integrated specialist Children's Cochlear Implant Unit which would incorporate all the relevant disciplines for management of implant requirements.

Fortunately our vision was greatly enhanced by the arrival of Jim Fagan, who is widely recognised as being a major contributor in latter years to the continuing financial viability and success of the Shepherd Centre in Sydney. The consistion of a development manager, especially one with respected credentials, has provided a professional basis and guiding light to our present and future expansion.

To this end we have launched a \$2 million appeal, integral to which is the purchase of our own premises at Toowong. The fund will also enable us to undertake comprehensive renovations and extensions, purchase much needed and state of the art equipment, increase our current staffing levels and to create a reserve to ensure our future financial viability.

The Centre has made responsible changes to its business operation by formulating a three year strategic plan, taking stock financially and expanding services to our children and families. Due to the demand from parents more emphasis has been placed on our cochlear implant program.

We have purchased more computer equipment for our office, developed a new accounting system for more efficient financial management and purchased a computerised donor anagement classification so that we can build our tor list and acquaint ourselves more advantageously with our supporters. These outlays have been costly but non-epetitious.

comprehensive policy and procedures manual corporating the activities and philosophies of the Centre, in stail, has been produced. The manual includes data on our sponsibilities, program guidelines, client acceptance criteria d health and safety. Perusal of this valuable handbook by consumers is encouraged and its contents will be regularly riewed in consultation with all our comprising bodies.

e numbers of children continue to grow at a rapid rate esently we have 42 children attending the Centre - twenty are hearing aid children and twenty four cochlear implant pients of whom fourteen are currently receiving ilitation and nine are attending for MAPping and ongoing ssment). Funding is, as ever, crucial to our success. This

year has seen great strides in this respect, all the more important in view of the total absence of State or Federal financial pledges. Representations have been made to DEET in Canberra for a Commonwealth capital grant to buy our property and we are grateful for the endorsements of Senator John Herron, Minister of Aborigninal and Torres Strait Islander Affairs; the Honourable John Moore, Minister for Industry, Science and Tourism; the Honourable Arch Bevis, Shadow Minister for Defence; and the Lord Mayor, Mr Jim Soorley. Representations have also been made to the Department of Health for staff resources in the new implant

Favourable responses will hopefully be the outcome from these exhaustive submissions and will assist in providing a sound financial basis for our proposed expansion.

The plans and aspirations of our Centre require considerable effort and strength. Our staffing is always critical in this regard and we maintain a comprehensive complement of both clinical and educational support. Without their high level of professional skill and dedication, we would be unable to provide the acknowledged standard of care.

Our congratulations, too, go to our Clinical Co-ordinator, Dimity Dornan, who is now a fully certified International Auditory-Verbal Therapist following her examination success is the United States. It is worth noting that Dimity is the first and only Australian-trained holder of this distinction.

Our Board has also undergone some restructuring. I would like, for a moment. To reflect on the role of Peter Klar, or chairman for the past four years who resigned due to work commitments. Peter joined the Hear and Say management committee (in the Chair position) in 1992 and worked tirelessly during our infant years to consolidate our initially tenuous position. He assisted in providing the sound foundations from which we operate today. We have been very fortunate indeed in having our association with him and he still maintains his link by providing continuing legal advice.

I would like to thank all the members of the Board for their enduring commitment, our staff for helping us to realise our aspirations for our children, and particularly to our loyal and generous supporters, both private and corporate.

The patronage of our Governor, Mrs Leneen Forde, has been very much appreciated and her ongoing considerable profile has much enhanced our reason for being. We thank her for her trust in our ability to achieve our goals for our Hear and Say Centre family.

We now look forward to a year of consolidation and growth and above all seeing our vision for our children on a successful journey to fruition.

# General Manager's Report

Like the metamorphosis of the butterfly, the year 1995-1996 has seen the Hear and Say Centre undergo considerable and rapid growth. Also, like the butterfly, the result is wonderful and I take great pride in sharing its' evolution.

When I first developed the concept of establishing a private, Auditory-Verbal charity program for hearing-impaired children and their families in 1991, and actively set out to achieve its fulfilment, I had little concept of what could be achieved. Even when the doors of the Hear and Say Centre first officially opened on the 6<sup>th</sup> July 1992 with 6 children, I could not anticipate the extent and scope of its future development.

The year 1995-1996 has particularly been one of exceptional growth with the projected figures of 40 children for the calender year ending 1996 being met by mid-year, six months earlier than anticipated.

The staff complement of 4 at the end of 1995 increased to 7 is year and we now have the services of a teacher of the af, two speech pathologists, an early childhood teacher, a uevelopment officer, accounts manager and office manager.

The Hear and Say Centre is moving closer to the total incorporation of the Queensland Children's Cochlear Implant Centre, Holy Spirit Hospital. We will then become the first fully integrated, specialist cochlear implant centre in Queensland. This will mean that cochlear implant services will be combined under one roof, involving a large multidisciplinary team effort servicing any child from throughout Queensland. Services will be greatly accelerated by being better co-ordinated and hopefully we will be able to achieve our aim of making implants available to suitable children at the ideal age of 18 months.

As we move closer towards becoming Queensland's first fully integrated, specialist cochlear implant centre, the help of our major sponsors becomes more significant. We have received no government help to this date apart from a one-off part-time clary grant for an Outreach Program teacher from the aming Machine Community Fund. The Queensland country Women's Association, the Broncos football club and the Pine Rivers Bowls Club have been of great assistance and we thank them for all their efforts. Mr Bob Bryan, Mr Dick Keevers and Merle Bowman of the MacArthur Club have also been generous in their work for our Centre.

The ongoing support we have received from the corporate giants of Thiess and SUNCORP has exceeded our dreams. The \$50,000 they have raised will be used to construct and technically equip a sound proof hearing assessment booth. We are extremely grateful to them and to Australian Hearing Services who have generously agreed to provide an audiologist to perform on-site hearing assessments and hearing aid fittings, further increasing our service to the children and their families.

Consistent efforts are being made to put a permanent roof over our children's heads. Our Development Manager, Jim Fagan, who joined us as a staff member in January, has been working tirelessly to this end. Should we be able to purchase a property, prominent Brisbane architect Robin Gibson's staff have already drawn up plans for a new Hear and Say Centre. We are hoping that the coming year will see its fruition.

At the start of 1996 we said farewell to former staff members Wendy Snider and Anne Lazenby. We welcomed Joan Newton, a well known teacher of the deaf who left her position as General Manager of the Shepherd Centre in Sydney to join our staff. Her assistance in developing an extensive Centre policy is greatly appreciated. We were also pleased to see Teresa Ruzzene, Speech Pathologist and Samantha Hauff, who now looks after our office administration, join our staff. Sally Willington now moves on to become Accounts Manager.

The children themselves continually amaze us with their ability and keep us all attuned to the fact that they are (or are becoming) listening members of our society. We particularly see the evidence in our Playgroup, run by Sue Hayne and assisted by volunteer Althea Pearson, which continues to be very popular. We seem to have quite a few new babies in the group and there is a constant stream of visitors, students and volunteers, all of whom are very generous in their time and contributions in various ways.

Parent education evenings have been enthusiastically received, and the social evenings for parents a great success. The Hear and Say Centre Offner Library (named for Mr Mac Offner O.B.E.) continues to be the most popular area at the Mouse House with parents and children making the most of this facility. A computer for the children has been donated by Clayfield Kindergarten and will be housed in this area.

Several successful "Butterflies functions", organised by chief Butterfly Anne Lazenby, have been well very attended and we are very grateful to this small but dedicated group of ladies.

Staff members have attended the Asia-Pacific Auditory-bal Conference in Taiwan and the Alexander Graham Bell Lociation for the Deaf Biennial Conference in Snowbird, Utah, United States of America. This has allowed a huge input of knowledge gleaned from international specialists. The information has not only been enriching for the staff and parents, but a number of other professionals have also benefited from what has been learned.

A very successful first has been accomplished this year, our annual workshop, Hear and Say at Home. Many professionals, including a representative from Cochlear Limited, donated their time to speak and the parents and professionals that attended were very pleased with the day. Special emphasis was placed on the vital importance of the parents to the success of the program and I would like to take the opportunity to thank our parents for their ongoing support.

The setting up of a research program has been a priority in 1996, with the employment of an independent assessor, Jane Barker, and the setting up of a database by Tamara Wilson with negotiations continuing with the University of Queensland's Speech Pathology and Audiology Department regarding suitable research project design.

Finally, I would like to thank our Chairperson, all our dedicated Board members, staff, volunteers and especially our families for their efforts in giving our children the chance to listen and to talk.

#### Note 1 - Statement of Accounting Policies

General purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with applicable Accounting Standards, the Corporations Law and other mandatory professional requirements (Urgent Issues Group Consensus Views), including the disclosure requirements of Schedule 5 of the Corporations Regulations. The accounts have been prepared on the basis of historical costs and do not take into account changing money values or current valuations of non-current assets, except where stated. Unless noted, the accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous year.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the company in the preparation of the accounts:

#### (a) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are brought to account at cost, less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation or amortisation. The carrying amount of property, plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount of these assets.

The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows which will be received from the assets employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have not been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over their anticipated useful lives commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use using the diminishing value method of calculation.

#### (b) Members' Guarantee

The company is limited by guarantee. If the company is wound up, the Memorandum and Articles of Association state that each member is required to contribute a maximum of \$2 each towards meeting any outstanding obligations of the company. At 30 June 1996 the number of members was 10 (1995: 10).

#### (c) Reconciliation of Cash

For the purpose of the Statement of Cash Flows, cash includes cash on hand and at bank, net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

#### (d) Taxation

The company is a registered charitable body exempt from income tax.

#### (e) Charitable Body

The company is a charitable body operating as a rehabilitation centre for hearing impaired children.

#### (f) Employee Benefits

The company has made no provision for employee benefits, if any, that exist at balance date. This matter is to be reviewed by the directors to determine the extent of the company's liability at any balance date.
